LOCAL VET GETS A STONE AFTER 99-YEAR WAIT

One of the easiest, least expensive, and most lasting projects any SCV Camp can do is the marking of Confederates whose burial places are unmarked.

Five members of the Taylor Camp met in Fort Worth's Oakwood Cemetery on the cold morning of Feb. 11 to install a VA marker for Pleasant M. Richards, a member of the 4th Missouri Cavalry. Richards died in Fort Worth in 1913.

VA markers are easy to obtain, cost only the stamp to mail in the application, and sometimes arrive within four weeks of the time they're ordered. Graves must be unmarked, and the VA now checks!

Documentation of the soldier's service must be included, along with signatures from next-of-kin or a cemetery official, and the person willing to accept delivery of the stone and install it.


At a hefty 240 pounds, you'll need some help, but don't let that deter you. Patterson and his wife regularly get them in and out of the back of a pickup.



This promises to be one of the most interesting programs we’ve hosted in many months. If you’re a member of the Camp, please make every effort to be with us.




WORLD FAMOUS WBTS HISTORIAN TO ADDRESS FORT WORTH CIVIL WAR ROUNDTABLE ON MARCH 6

Mr. Ed Bearss, Chief Historian Emeritus of the National Park Service, will speak in Fort Worth on the evening of Tuesday, March 6. He will address the regular monthly meeting of the Fort Worth Civil War Roundtable. The topic will be the Battle of Five Forks, Virginia, on which Mr. Bearss wrote the definitive work...incidentally one of his favorites. His skills as a storyteller are well-known across the land, and no one with an interest in the WBTS should pass up an opportunity to meet him and hear him speak.

He was born in 1923 within a bicycle ride of the Little Bighorn Battlefield. In 1941 after graduating from high school he enlisted in the U. S. Marine Corps, where he served in the 3rd Marine Raider Battn. and the First Marine Div., and in the invasions of

Guadalcanal and New Britain. Badly wounded by machine gun fire in early 1944, he spent 26 months in hospitals.

After the service he earned a BS degree at Georgetown, writing his thesis on Pat Cleburne. He earned an MA from Indiana University in 1955.


His honors have been many, but he still leads battlefield tours for the Smithsonian, the National Geographic Society, and the National Trust for Historic Preservation, to name only a few. At eighty-eight years of age, Mr. Bearss is a living National Treasure.



ANOTHER NEW FACE ON THE VETERANS MEMORIAL IN BEDFORD

Every day it seems someone contacts us with new information or photographs about our northeast Tarrant County veterans. About two weeks into the New Year we got an email from Jim Crawford, offering to share some photos of his great-great grandfather, Samuel A. Woods.

Woods enlisted in Wise County in Co. B, 15th Texas Cavalry, and lived for several years after the War in northeast Tarrant County near Euless. He married the sister of our twin-brother veterans, Ryan and Bryant Harrington. Woods and his wife lie buried in Bryant Harrington's family cemetery just inside the Dallas County line in Irving in the old Estelle Community.



REAL SON OF THE CONFEDERACY GONE AT AGE 99

James Brown Sr., 99, of Tellico Village, Tennessee, one of the last real sons of a Confederate veteran, died Thursday afternoon in a Farragut nursing home, his son, James Brown, Jr., said Saturday afternoon. James Brown Sr.'s father, James H. H. Brown, served in the 8th Georgia Infantry's Company K and fought throughout the Civil War.

Mr. Brown would've turned 100 on Valentine's Day. James Brown Jr. said his grandfather was 71 when his father, James Brown Sr., was born in 1912.

James H. H. Brown joined the Confederate army at the beginning of the Civil War and fought in 19 major battles, including Manassas, Gettysburg, Chattanooga, Campbell Station and Fort Sanders.

"He made it to the end at Appomattox with the surrender of Lee and then he walked back home," James Brown said. "He was wounded twice and, back then with the medical situation, he could've had a leg lopped off and bled to death." Mr. Brown had lung cancer two years ago and had treatment. His son said Mr. Brown's health began to deteriorate quickly in the past few weeks.

"At 100, everything starts to wear out. He went very quietly. He went in peace, comfortable without pain," his son said. "He had a ton of friends who came down to see him the last couple days. He was a popular man, a real country gentleman. He enjoyed people and they enjoyed him."

A memorial service is set for 11 a.m. Feb. 14 at Tellico Village Community Church. Click Funeral Home in Lenoir City, Tenn. is in charge of arrangements.


