Special lady in Tarrant County history to be honored this spring.

Four years ago we honored Fort Worth's first mayor, Dr. William P. Burts, with a new stone recognizing his Confederate service. Around that time we learned his mother-in-law, buried two graves south of him in Oakwood Cemetery, was

also a local celebrity.





Sarah D. (White) Henderson (1803-1884) is one of only two ladies we've discovered who ever lived here in our county who were daughters of soldiers in the American Revolution. Coincidentally, the other one is also buried at Oakwood.

Her father, Gordon White (1761-1835) was a member of Col. Hubbard's Virginia Line. He is buried in Virginia.

On Thursday, Jan. 28, three of our members, Ron Turner and Bob Gresham (at left) and the photographer, James Alderman, installed this stone at her grave.

All three men are also members of the Major K. M. Van Zandt Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution. The Van Zandt Chapter financed the stone and will coordinate a public dedication this spring in cooperation with other local heritage organizations. We'll let you know details later.

Writer and historian Bob Zeller is one of the country's leading authorities on Civil War photography. He is the author of "*The Blue and Gray in Black and White: A History of Civil War Photography*" (Praeger, 2005), the first narrative history about the war's photographers, what they did and why they did it.

Who are we? We are the Col. Ennis Ward Taylor Camp #1777


Our meetings are on the last Thursday of each month, except November and December when we don't meet because it would always conflict with the holidays.
