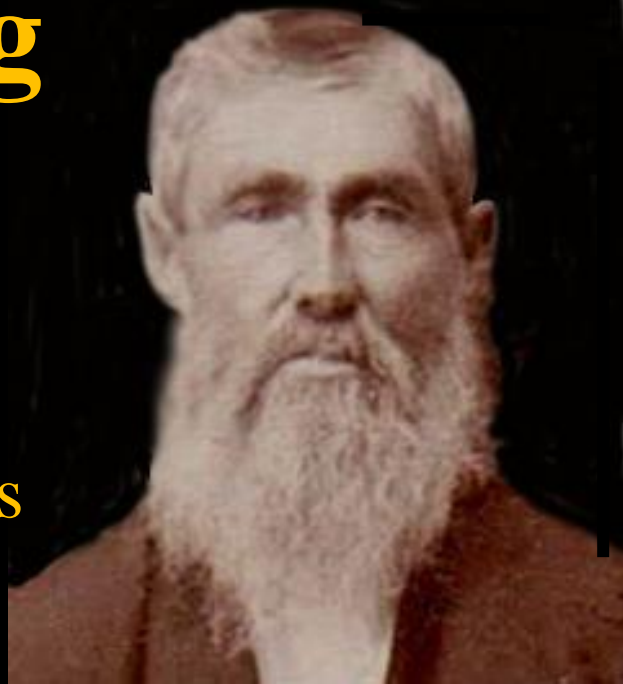

CONFEDERATE LIVES STILL MATTER

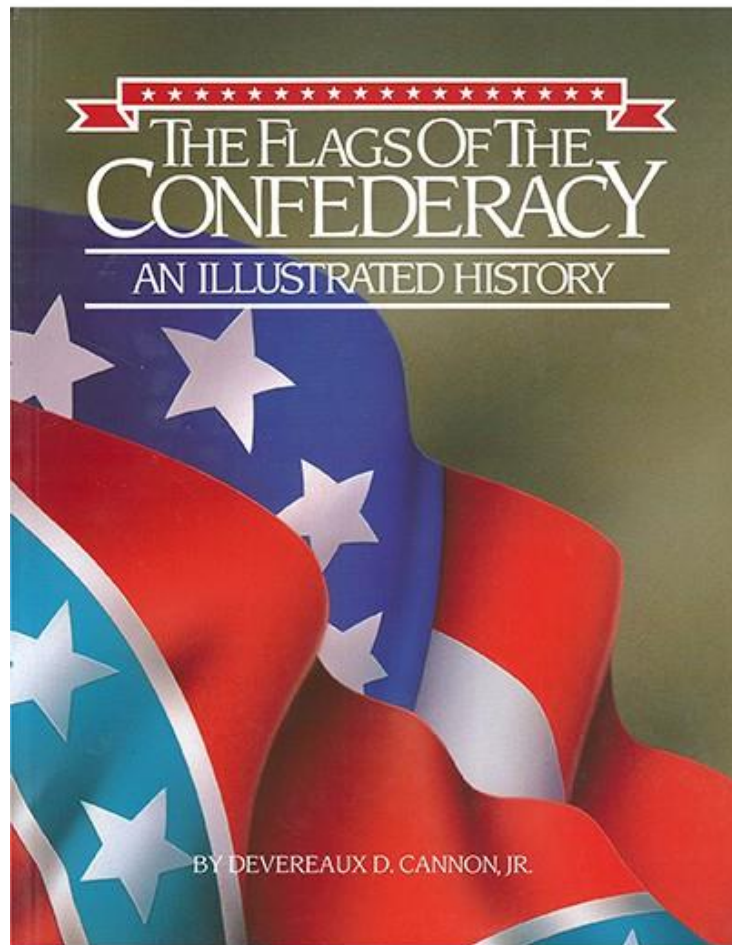

The Charge is a part of the opening ceremony for every camp meeting of the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

We appreciate Jim and his willingness to help not only his own camp but ours as well.

On Wednesday, April 7, at 11 a.m Commander Rich McCook presented his program “Flags of the Confederacy” at the Ridglea Country Club to the Julia Jackson Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. The Julia Jackson Chapter was created in Fort Worth in 1897, and continues to speak up for the Confederate Soldiers and their roles in founding this state





On March 31 three Taylor Campers Joe Wade, Bobby Gresham and James Alderman (the photographer) cleaned about five Confederate stones in Soldiers Row in Oakwod in Fort Worth. One they cleaned was Sevier Pickett, of Co. D. Speight's Btn. Texas Cav.

Mr. Pickett was born in Crawford Co., Arkansas, and was named for one of his great-grandfathers, American Revolutionary War hero and first Governor of Tennessee, John Sevier.

Sevier Pickett and two of his brothers served in Texas Confederate units and all three lived for a time in Northeast Tarrant County.

Mr. Pickett was the express agent on the first Texas and Pacific train run from Fort Worth to Marshall, Texas in 1876, and retired from the railroad after 45 years of service.

One of the Pickett brother, Gregg W. Pickett, is slated to receive a replacement marker at Oakwood in the near future. The third brother, Gustavus C. Pickett, served in the 3rd Texas Cavalry in Ross' Brigade and lie buried in the State Cemetery in Austin, Texas.

Meeting adjourned a approximately 7:25 p.m.

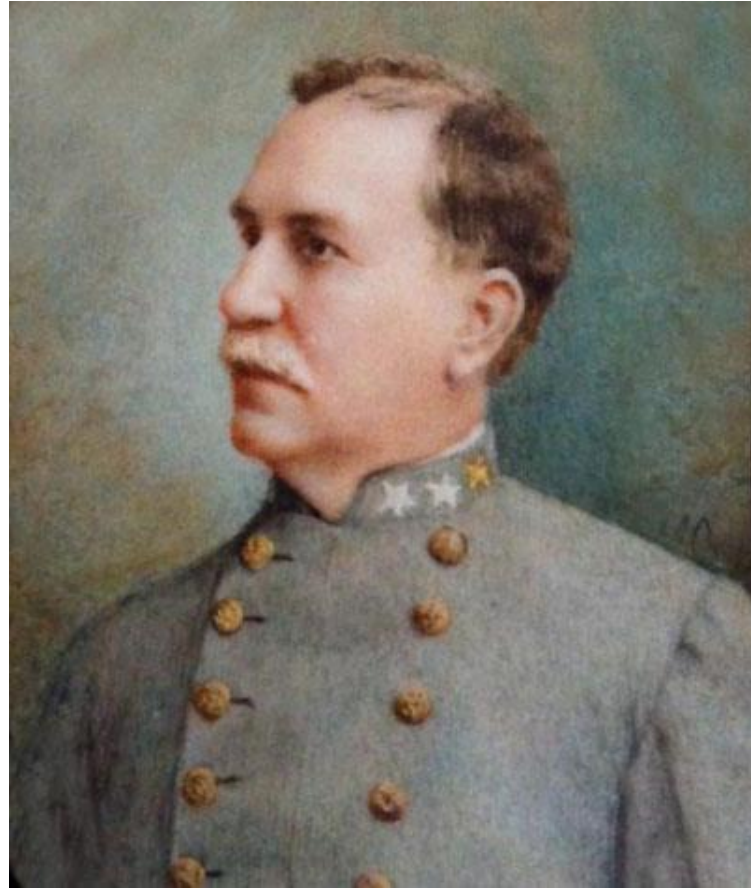
