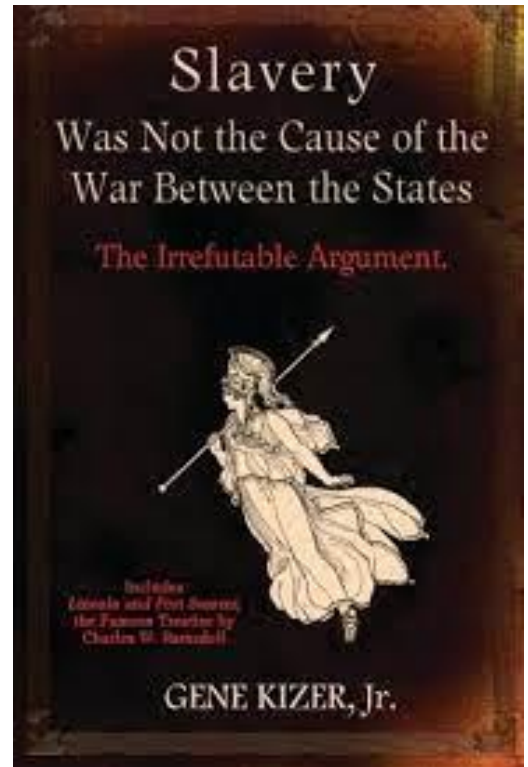

In Memory of Compatriot Robert Truitt

Compatriot Bob Truitt, was a long-time member of our Camp. He was also a member of the SAR, the Huguenot Society, the Sons and Daughters of Antebellum Planters, Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims, and Sons and Daughters of the Colonial and Antebellum Bench and Bar.

He was born in 1928 in Breckenridge, grew up in West Texas, and worked on construction at the Midland Army Air Field in WWII.

After graduating from Odessa High School and attending TCU with his future wife, Dorothy Lynn Butler, of Midland, they married in 1947 and shared an amazing 73-year life together, including three sons and one daughter.

Bob had an long productive career in the oil business and the electric business. He also worked long and widely in non-profit agencies in the places he lived and worked.

He enjoyed hunting, studying Texas history, genealogy, and golf. There was a Golden Wedding Cruise to the Caribbean which included all four of the children and their families.



He and Dorothy also enjoyed special trips to Hawaii, Alaska, England and Scotland.

In his later years he spent nearly his entire day, each day, caring for his beloved wife who passed away in 2020.

In 2021 he finally moved to his family's long-time Erath County ranch, where he enjoyed sitting on the front porch visiting with family and friends, and watching all the wildlife meander through the property.

Bob Truitt died on January 15, 2022, and his ashes will be placed in the pioneer cemetery on his ranch in a private service.

James met with the UDC group on February 2 in Ft. Worth.

Some time ago vandals cut down seven of the cast-iron Confederate crosses in the cemetery but left them in a hidden pile on-site. Together we are having seven of these crosses cut into 12" x 12" x 4" pieces of polished gray granite (with the design at center below) to be laid at grass level so as to replace each cross. They will be heavy, difficult to remove, and will have zero recycle value.

Our ancestors were men of action!



The painting above, *Vengeance at Okolona*, is by one of America's greatest-ever WBTS artists, John Paul Strain. It depicts one moment in a cavalry battle in the Mississippi Backwoods. Standing at six-feet-two-inches tall, broad-shouldered, athletic and powerful, General Nathan Bedford Forrest towered over most men of his era. As his personal weapons, Forrest carried a Colt 36-caliber revolver and an 1840 model cavalry saber, which he sharpened to a razor's edge. Forrest did not send men into battle; he led them, as he is about to do in this work.

Yet another “real son” of an American Revolutionary veteran discovered buried in Tarrant County.

We’d like to introduce you to Nathan Allman (1795-1864) who died on his land-grant which straddles the Parker and Tarrant County line in north Azle.

We learned about him several years ago, but not his tie to the ARW. His daughter, Sarah Hamilton, and some of her kids were victims of a Kiowa raid there in April, 1867. Long, interesting story which continues into today. One of Sarah’s kids was kept by the Indians, married one of them, and has living Kiowa descendants.

We recently found an affidavit Nathan made in Missouri in 1846. He was helping his mother get a pension on the basis of his father, Thomas’, Revolutionary service in the North Carolina Line. We also know of at least four other “real sons” buried in Tarrant County.

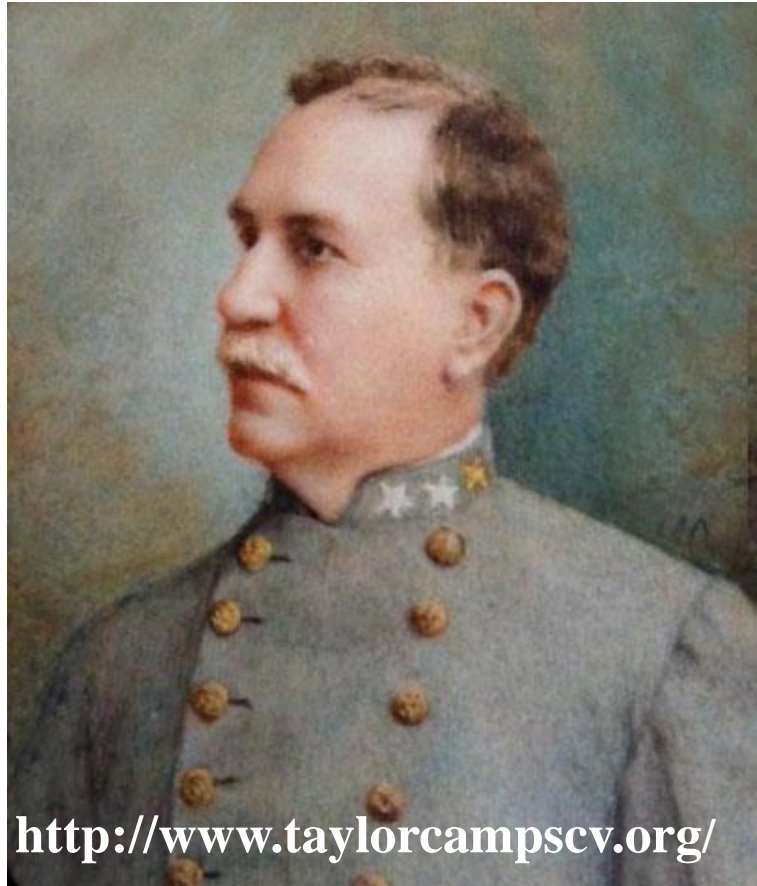
