


Join us on Thursday evening, April 27, for our annual candle-light ceremony in which we honor our own Confederate ancestors.



He owned 220 acres around Grapevine where he enlisted on the first day of January 1862. He spent most of his time in the service as a teamster. He died near Grapevine in 1889 and was buried with no headstone for nearly 125 years.

We got him one from the VA and carved his wife an epitaph on the back of it.


We also funded, fabricated, and installed the cenotaph there for Rev.







MAJ. J. M. HANDLEY IS LAID TO REST

[April 2, 1908][

Noted Confederate Afterwards Won Fame as Salesman

The funeral of Major J. M. Handley, for whom Handley, Texas, was named, was held Wednesday afternoon from his late residence in that place, where he died Tuesday. Interment was made in the Handley cemetery.

Major Handley, who secured his military title by noted service in the Confederate army, had been a resident of Handley for fourteen years. He was known thruout Texas, having been one of the pioneer traveling salesmen

He was popularly reputed to be the highest salaried salesman of his time. At the time of his retirement he was drawing a fixed salary of \$10,000 a year from the Hornthall, Whitehead & Wiseman Company of New York in addition to all expenses. Despite his large earnings he died a poor man, his life having been marked by the greatest generosity and freedom with money. He contributed to many charities and to many churches. He was a native of Birmingham, Ala., where a brother is his only surviving relative.

He was 71 years of age at the time
of his death and had been in feeblo
health for a long time.

The funeral was attended by many friends from Fort Worth. Pallbearers were James Woods, J. A. Martin, David Farnsworth, R. M. Davis and B. Watson. Rev. Collins of Arlington confucted the service.





Major James Madison Handley was Major of Co. H, 46th Alabama Infantry, according to headstone and official records in Washington,

DC. A major was actually an officer who ranked next above a captain, and was in charge of two or more regiments. Major Handley was apparently a lifelong bachelor. He died in Handley on March 31, 1908 and was buried in the old Handley Cemetery (which is now nearly hidden by the power plants which surround it).

His body was removed on August 3, 1930 and was reburied near the entrance to what is now Shannon Rose Hill Cemetery nearby. He was buried just inside a high retaining wall and a bronze plate was placed on the wall at his feet. His date of death on that plate was erroneously given as March 25, 1906 and the mistake was later repeated on his VA stone. The VA stone was publicly dedicated on March 25, 1976, the mistaken anniversary of his death.

On March 7 two more Fort Worth Confederates finally got the headstones they deserved. Both have been lying in unmarked graves in Oakwood Cemetery for nearly a century.

Charles Adkins was a private in Co. F of the 29th Texas Cavalry. He enlisted in the summer of 1862 in Red River County, Texas. Mr. Adkins died in Fort Worth in 1914. We found a descendant living in Amarillo.

William G. Beckham served in Cayce's Company of Light Artillery in Purcell's Battery, a Virginia unit in the Army of Northern Virginia. He was severely wounded in 1864, and was paroled at Richmond in May, 1865. Mr. Beckham died in 1918 in Fort Worth. We found a descendant of Mr. Beckham living in Azle.

In spite of the new, more stringent application standards, we continue to be able to get a few headstones for worthy veterans.

As we continue to scan through the Tarrant County Confederate pension files, we occasionally find veterans who have no headstones. When we can find living descendants, we'll apply for VA stones. For the others, we may figure out ways to raise money to get them commercially-made monuments.



Nearly two generations passed, and he was again elected to sit in the governor's chair in 1997 at the age of 74, the oldest man to be governor in state history when he left office at the age of 78. In the interim he ran for governor three times was but defeated in each attempt.

His paternal grandfather, Joseph Franklin Underwood, served in the Yankee army during the War.

George Pickett's fame will live forever in U. S. history, no matter what the politicians and revisionists do. Fort Pickett is being renamed for a very brave and deserv-




ing American veteran of World War II who earned the Congressional Medal of Honor in an assault in Italy in May 1944. His actions are truly amazing.



Meeting Minutes

Meeting was called to order at 6:55 pm at the Catfish Co. Restaurant by Cmdr Richard McCook.

Opening Invocation was given by Chaplain Joe Wade.

Opening Pledges lead by Vann Cunningham. The Charge was read by Charles Harrison.

Cmdr McCook then welcomed everyone and acknowledged our Guest present: Ja Ann Alderman, Melony McNabb, and Phoebe Harrison. (fee)


Who are we? We are the Col. Ennis Ward Taylor Camp #1777
