Outgoing Commander John James McCammon is speaking. Incoming Commander Mike Hurley is seated to our right in the photo at left.


Mike often comes to our camp and gives programs, and is exactly the type of person we need as the public face of the Sons of Confederate Veterans...witty, talented, and personable.

NAMES ON THE MAP



Joseph Manning Henderson, for whom one of Fort Worth's major streets was named, was born in Bradley County, Tennessee in 1840. After moving to Missouri with his parents and siblings, the family eventually settled at Birdville in Tarrant County in 1851. Young Joseph was the first to mark the way from Birdville to Dallas, having done so by using his team to drag a log through the sea of grass between the two towns.


When the War came, he went to where Waller's Texas Cavalry was camped in Louisiana and joined several other local men who were already in one of its companies. He was shot in the mouth during the Battle of Yellow Bayou, Louisiana in 1864, losing five teeth and having his jaw broken. He kept the minie ball for the rest of his life and often showed it to friends. At the end of the War his command was on the lower Brazos, from where he returned home.

One of Henderson brothers, John E. Henderson, was killed in the Battle of Mansfield, Louisiana. Another of his brothers, William C. Henderson, was also in the Confederate service. Both Mr. Henderson's sisters married Birdville Confederates: John Akers and John Hardisty. After the War Mr. Henderson was prominent in local Democratic politics, and served as Tarrant County Sheriff in 1876-1880. He was also elected to the office of Tarrant County Tax Assessor-Collector, and even held both offices at the same time for a while.


In addition to his public service, he was also a large landowner, farmer, and stockraiser. He was known here for his fine horses and cattle, including one of the first herds of Shorthorns in this area.

Joseph M. Henderson died of cancer in Fort Worth on August 30, 1903. We have been able to find no photographs of him, though it seems likely with his prominence and comfortable lifestyle at least one must be in the hands of his descendants somewhere.

He was buried in Birdville Cemetery in present-day Haltom City. His son, Robert, a veteran of World War I, lies buried beside him.

For some time now we've been doing a page in each newsletter featuring articles in the Startlegram about something that happened in and around Fort Worth a century of so before the current newsletter's date. Several weeks ago I spent some time finding articles for December and working backwards.

<u>About one month ago we lost our access to full pages</u> of the oldest Fort Worth newspapers, pre 1922. At that time they "merged" with a service which offered obituaries only from the beginning to the present.

During the night of June 5-6 they further cut back and now, in the thousands of newspapers they offer, <u>everything</u> from before about 1985 has been removed.



Army renames Louisiana base for Black WWI hero who received Medal of Honor

Founded in 1941 for the regular army and named for Confederate general Leonidas Polk, this is another installation falling victim to the Naming Commission.

The base was renamed on June 13 for Sgt. William Henry Johnson, a Black hero of World War I who received the Medal of Honor nearly a century later.

We respect and honor Sgt. Johnson for his bravery and valor, but we feel the renaming process has dishonored many men whose service was just as vital in safeguarding the Constitutional rights of a large percentage of the population in 1861-1865.

There are many other sites which could just as well have been named for Sgt. Johnson without dishonoring General Polk, who died in service in Georgia in 1864.

Confederate names being removed from national Ranger monument

The names of four Confederate soldiers are no longer visible on a monument to U.S.

Army Rangers at Fort Moore. Army officials confirmed the names have been obscured as they work [to get clearance] to remove them completely. The actions are part of the law this year that also changed the installation's name from Fort Benning to Fort Moore.

National Ranger Memorial Foundation chairman Joseph Stringam objects to what he calls the monument's defacement.

"The Ranger Memorial is a Ranger monument. It is not a Confederate monument. It has been privately owned and supported by Rangers, past, present and hopefully future."


